- Noticed some additional flow from Old Chatham. Flow is white. Usually in the afternoon, sometimes around 5-6pm. Spoke with David they will be making 3 trips instead of 2.
- GHD is finishing up an industrial user review and we will need to come up with a permit. This will require some type of flow meter and some type of pretreating.
